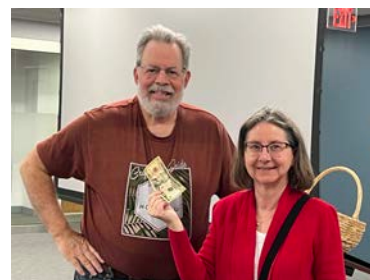

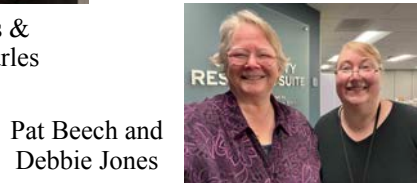

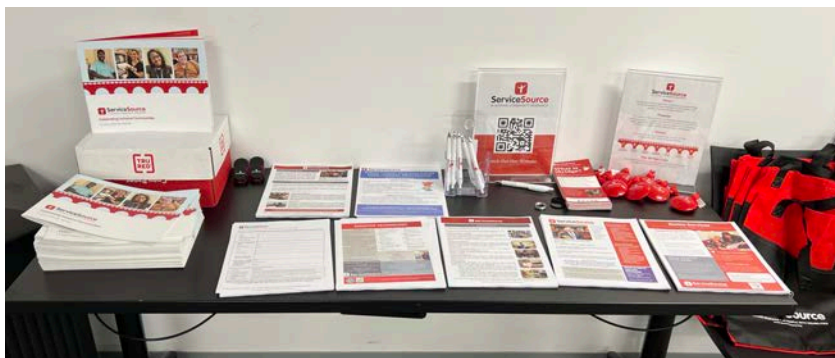
NVRC FILM FEST 2024 with ReelAbilities

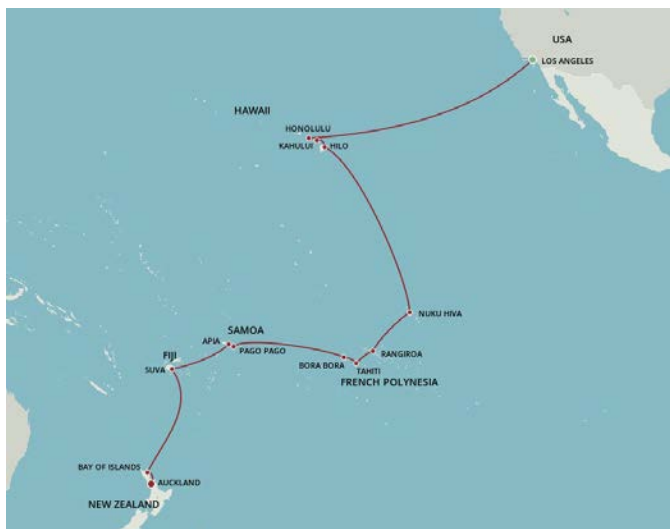


What: A 196 Days Voyage around the world

Date of this report: Friday, February 21, 2024

Current Location: At Tasman Sea on a 600 ft Ship, Oceania Insignia, cruising around 18 to 19 knots

Heading To: Sydney, Australia



Polynesian Panorama Segment (30 days):
Los Angeles, CA to Auckland, New Zealand

Note: Didn't stop at Nuku-Hiva and Kahului, replaced with Kailua-Kona and Nawiliwili



Jewels of New Zealand Segment (11 days):

Note: Did not go around Milford Sound due to upcoming storm of 20 ft waves. Instead we cruised back to Cook Strait and then straight to Sydney.



Longest "At Sea" was 5 days between Los Angeles and Kailua-Kona and 5 days between Honolulu and Rangiroa, French Polynesia



We were not bored, as the ship's entertainment team kept us occupied with games, enrichment sessions, evening performances, country-fair, and this fun loving "Make your own boat" competition. New friends, Randi and Geoff, won 4th place.

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Do you recognize this Morten Bay Fig at the Allerton Garden on Kauai Island? It had a role in the film, "Jurassic Park." It is able to grow up to 164 feet tall, has a strong trunk and massive buttress roots for stability.



Outside of the town of Hilo, lies the Rainbow Falls which drop 80 feet to create a large pool below. It plunges in front of a natural lava cave created by the powerful splash back. Easily accessible with hand rails and rocky steps to the top.



While we were on a shore excursion at the Hawaii Volcanoes National Park at the Kuhuku sector, Barry is watching the Houston Texans vs Baltimore Ravens game on his iPhone while our guide explained the history of the 1868 Volcano Eruption Disaster.

The lava from the 1868 eruption flowed a mile wide, with spouting jets of lava rushing up to 100 to 200 ft high, and spreading down into the ocean.

decommissioned and stricken in 1971. Bowfin was declared a national Historic Landmark in 1986; it was filmed in "War and Remembrance" TV Series in 1987; and also filmed for the Midway movie in 2018.

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Tutuila Island is one of the five main islands and two coral atolls that makes up American Samoa, an USA Territory. Tutuila Island is the largest and most populous island. A vast majority of the 45,000 residents living in American Samoa are indigenous ethnic Samoans. Most of the people speak both English and Samoan fluently. It was surely a cultural experience for us. We boarded a wooden school bus (vintage or antique or simply an old vehicle ?) for our shore excursion to the eastern part of the island - about a 45 minute drive along the coastal shoreline.



He spoke about coconuts (a demonstration how to open one) and tattoos. The island hosts a huge Tisa's Tattoo Festival each year in late October. It is a traditional Samoan Tatau Art that the Samoans wish to conserve.

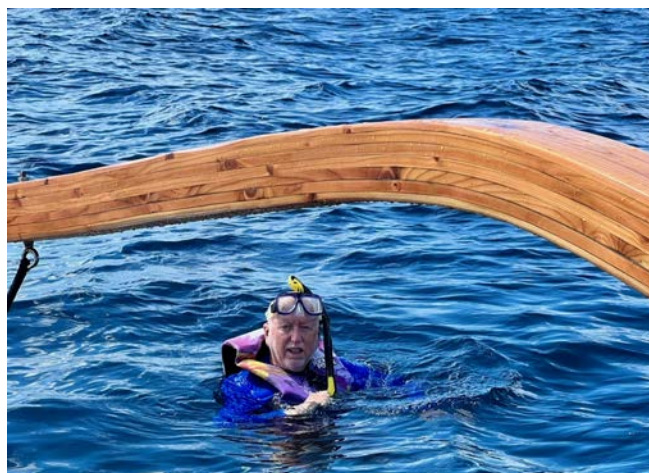

The Cardboard Cathedral in Christchurch, NZ was erected in 2012-2014 with a roof of 96 cardboard rolls that were reinforced with laminated wood beams and coated with waterproof polyurethane and flame retardants, timber, and steel. The cardboard rolls have two-inch gaps between them so that light can filter inside. Instead of a replacement rose window, the building has triangular pieces of stained glass. When we were there in 2016, it was one of the main tourist attractions.

Cruising Around The World with Barry and Vicki

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Dunedin Train Station is one of the most attractive rail stations in the world. Built in 1904, the station was officially opened in 1906. In an eclectic, revived Flemish renaissance style, (Renaissance Revival architecture), the station is constructed of dark basalt from Kokonga in the Strath-Taieri with lighter Oamaru stone facings, giving it the distinctive light and dark pattern. Pink granite was used for a series of supporting pillars which line a colonnade at the front. The roof was tiled in terracotta shingles from Marseilles surmounted by copper-domed cupolas. The southern end is dominated by the 37-metre clocktower visible from much of central Dunedin, NZ. (Source: Wikipedia)



This Olveston house in Dunedin, NZ was designed by Ernest George in the Jacobean style in the early 20th century for the Theomin family. When Dorothy Theomin died in 1966, the house, garden and contents were gifted to the city, and are now open to the public. The house is decorated and furnished much as it was when the family lived there, creating a snapshot of upperclass colonial Edwardian life. The Theomins were avid collectors and their art, furniture, weapons and decorative items can be seen throughout the house.

Tour of the 9-1-1 Center and the Emergency Operations Center on March 27, 2024

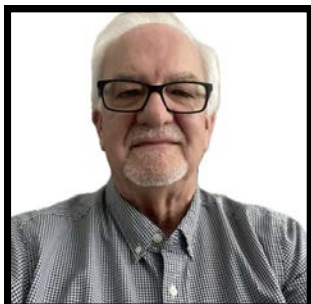
We will be doing two tours (one after the other) in the same facility — the 9-1-1 Center with explanations of how things work, and the Emergency Operations Center with a show and tell about how the County handles large emergencies. This facility is located at 4890 Alliance Drive, Fairfax 22030. The building is known as the PSTOC (Public Safety and Transportation Operations Center). It is just off West Ox Road - across the street from COSTCO.

We should arrive early enough to park and get through security (NO WEAPONS ARE PERMITTED) — suggest that you plan to get there by 9:45. The tours will start in a conference room at 10:00am. Interpreters will be provided. During the tour, we will be able to view the 9-1-1 Center and operations, but access to the 9-1-1 Center floor (where the operators continuously deal with emergencies) is restricted. Unless there is some kind of emergency, we should be able to go into the Emergency Operations Center (EOC) to see its capabilities and discuss Fairfax County response operations. We need a head count so please RSVP no later than March 22 to Pat Beech at pgbeech@aol.com. After the tours end, we may go back to the same conference room for more Q&A if needed. Those who are interested can go out for lunch (we will discuss after RSVPs are received). Note: If there is a real emergency/crisis, the tours may be cancelled at the last minute.
