


Hello, Happy Hands Members and Friends,

Did you attend the State School for the Deaf or regular public school? Regular public school.

If you attended the State School for the Deaf, where was it located? My father attended Pennsylvania School for the Deaf, and my mother went to Virginia School for the Deaf.

What was your favorite subject in high school and why? Aviation mechanics. Why? As a boy, I wanted a career in aviation.

Did you attend college after graduating from high school? If so, where? What was your degree?

Oktoberfest Facts



List of facts (compiled by Lois Herberger):

- Oktoberfest is an annual beer festival in Germany.
- Not all Germans celebrate Oktoberfest. It is a regional festival in southeastern part of Germany called Bavaria. Munich is the capital of Bavaria, Germany.
- Oktoberfest originated on October 12, 1810, as a royal wedding celebration between King Ludwig I and Crown Princess Therese of Saxony Hildburghausen.
- Citizens of Munich gathered at Theresienwiese, a large meadow to attend the festivities and watch horse races.
- Most royal weddings do not become annual festivities. Instead there were some annual horse race events until it was discontinued during the 19th century.
- During the 1800s, festivals evolved with more features like contests, exhibitions, livestock and other farm products. Fun games and activities were also included with lively band music for entertainment.
- Oktoberfest events were moved to September due to better weather conditions.
- Local breweries sponsored the festivals, set up beer tents with rows of tables and benches. Everyone can enjoy the festivities, drink beer, wine and other non-alcoholic drinks Apfelschorle (apple juice with sparkling water) and sodas. Traditional German cuisines like sausages, pretzels and other refreshments are sold too.
- Beer drinking is mainly for social and cultural interactions, not only for intoxication.
- Oktoberfest attracts millions of international visitors who enjoy this kind of event like a large folk festival, or a sense of community. People get a taste of Bavarian culture and heritage with many old and new traditions.
