


Hello, Happy Hands Members and Friends,


On September 25, NVRC will host a presentation on SCAMS. See page 15 for more information. In-person attendance is encouraged.

sased in Charlevoix, Micnigan, Craig Mitchell Smith took a palmetr, theatrical set designer, home restorer, and florist. At ape 42, Smith discovered glass when he attended a fusedglass workshop after a friend who had signed up for the class was unable to take it. Since then, Smith has developed his own techniques for forming glass in the kin. He has exhibited his work at Dow Gardens in Midland, Michigan, Epcot Center at Disney World, Minnesota Landscape Arboretum, Missouri Botanical Gardens in St. Louis, and the Norfolk Botanical Gardens among many others. The MSV installation is Smith's fourteenth.

"Moonbridge"

Formed with blue and iridescent glass wrapping around the entire length of the stainess-steel frame.



"Daffodil Wind"
Thirty glass blossoms
dance on stainless-steel
arced stems.



"Hollyhocks"
Inspired by the original celluloid hollyhocks used in "Wizard of Oz."



"Wisteria"
Each blossom is an expressionistic painting with clear, white, and blue glass chips used as brush strokes.



"Crepe Myrtle"
One tiny portion of
a crepe myrtle
explodes in this
lavish red crepe
myrtle branch.



"Wave Crest"

This reflects Smith's fascination with water. He "painted" it into existence with hundreds of pieces of broken glass "water droplets."

"Fireball"
Smith created this
150-pound orb ablaze
in flame-colored glass.



"Trumpet Flower"
This is evocative of the flowers in Smith's mother's bridal bouquet.



"Starflower"
This blossom evokes fireworks.





"Spring"

Shaped like a spring and colored to evoke the season of spring.

This piece is constructed of three stainless-steel springs with blue, champagne, and violet glass.





"Geranium"

Moved by a gift, the artist created this sculpture of bright red glass blossoms.

150 florets of
the two glass
hydrangea blossoms

This complex,
stainless- steel
dandelion bursts with
delicate fans of
iridized glass.

"Autumn Chandelier"
Golden amber to
burnished copper-colored
glass leaves adorn this
massive chandelier.



"Tree of Life"
Inspired by the energy
of the tree of life
in the film "Avatar"



"Orange Blossom"
Smith's vivid childhood memory snuggling into grandma's ornate brooch inspired this piece constructed of stainless steel with bold orange, tangerine, and yellow glass "gems".





"Dance of the Dragonflies"

Smith and his team hand-painted the lacey patterns of the dragonfly wings using an air-capture enamel process. Black iridescent glass conveys the dragonfly eyes.

"Bromeliad"

The artist created this plant, because he was frustrated by his inability to keep a bromeliad plant alive. He was fascinated by bracts, which are modified leaf-like structures on a plant that attract insects.



"Goldenrod"
This sculpture displays hundreds of tiny yellow glass florets.



"Water Lilies"

Smith's tour of an ancient temple in Sri Lanka inspired this creation of deep blue glass water lilies.



"Lilac"

Smith rendered this lilac in full bloom using glossy and frosted violet glass. The stem with textured and polished leaves highlights the lilac's beauty.





"Eastern Tiger Swallowtail"
Inspired by Virginia's state insect,
Smith created the 10 glass butterflies.



"Blue Star Rising"

This refers to the planet Venus, which often appears as a blue tinted star. This 200-pound orb includes 72 blue glass "rays".

"Apple Blossom"

Delicate whisper-pink blossoms bloom from a stainless-steel branch.



"California Poppies"
Inspired by fields of wild poppies that Smith saw on hillsides during a drive in California, he created those tangerine glass blossoms.



"Heliconia"
Smith was inspired to create this piece, because his trips to Hawaii were inspired by the flower.



"Anthurium"
Red, pink, and white glass anthurium blossoms on a frame with green glass leaves



"Grapevine"
Violet and purple glass
grape clusters sway on a
grapevine. Each grape
is singulary cut and
fired.












JESUS: A Deaf Missions Film

Previously, he worked as a Legislative Correspondent for the United States Senate and as an Education Specialist at the Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education under the State Director of Special Education. Following his work for the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education, he worked for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing Program of Boston Children's Hospital as the Outreach and Support Services Coordinator. Prior to joining Sprint/T-Mobile he was the Director of Special Projects and Compliance at The Learning Center for the Deaf. He has worked for the Gallaudet Leadership Institute and has led several cultural exchange programs between deaf adults and students in Massachusetts and China/India. Currently he is the Accessibility Relationship Manager for IP Relay with T-Mobile Accessibility. In his spare time, Kevin is an avid reader and passionate supporter of all Boston area sports teams.



Born and raised in Atlanta, GA, Felecia Smith moved to Richmond, VA in 1999. She attended the JSRCC's Interpreter Training Program and became an interpreter in 2006. During the first two years of her interpreting career, she worked as a sign language interpreter for Hanover School system before transitioning to work at Purple Communications in 2008. Shortly after joining Purple, she earned a National Interpreting Certification (NIC) and for 13 years performed in various roles as Interpreter, VRS Trainer, Center Supervisor, Center Manager and for the last 2 years, Regional Manager of Operations. As Regional Manager, she was responsible for the oversight of 7 centers in 4 different states on the east coast. She joined VDDHH in 2021 as the Virginia Relay Manager and now works to spread awareness of services offered through Virginia Relay and offer training to organizations to ensure that they can recognize and process all relay calls. In her free time, she enjoys refurbishing furniture and working on various projects around the house.
